DON'T FALL FOR FRAUD - KEEPING YOURSELF AND YOUR FAMILY SAFE FROM THE FRAUDSTERS - NEIL MCCALLUM AND TIM SALT

Ever had someone knock on your door and tell you they can repair the problem with your roof you didn't know about? Or an email asking for help from a friend or relative who is stranded abroad? Fraud is now 40% of all recorded crimes in the UK. Last year fraudsters stole £1.2 billion. That's £2,300 for every minute of the year. The good news is that, even in this technology-driven world, a few simple steps can dramatically increase your financial safety and reduce the risks of someone cheating you.



Neil has over thirty years' experience of public sector performance and review work. He currently manages a portfolio of international projects, working with a range of judicial, law enforcement and nonaovernment organisations on issues of accountability, transparency and good governance. He has worked on these issues in Botswana, Ethiopia,

The Gambia and numerous other countries, including the UK.

Tim was a serving police officer heading the West Midlands Police Fraud Squad. He was a founder member and chair of the Association of Chief Police Officers Working Group on Fraud and Chair of the National Fraud Forum, and represented the Police in discussions with the Law Commission on offences of fraud and corruption. Since leaving the police he has provided fraud and corruption prevention programmes for a wide range of organisation in both the public and private sectors across Europe, Africa and Asia. He has been an IPA member for more than 50 years.

Membership News

At the last count 216 **new members** have registered with us since the start of the u3a year. This is more than the whole of last year. We welcome them all. As in previous years, 70% tell us that they heard of u3a through a friend. 15% indicated a willingness to **volunteer** in some way. Some have already taken up new roles along with other longer serving members who came forward at the volunteers' event. This is great news.

However, there are of course still gaps to fill. The Third Age Trust suggests that every u3a needs at least 20% of their membership to be actively involved in some aspect of running the organisation. Please do get in touch if you feel you have time and skills to offer.

We continue to see some increased use of the **Facebook** chat page which is only available to Swindon u3a members. Recent posts have included information about upcoming talks, local initiatives, new groups and asking for help from other members.

For the last 2 years we have held **focus groups** in order to help us know more about what members think about various aspects of how Swindon u3a operates. We will soon be reviewing this idea and discussing if and how we develop it this year. Watch this space!



1.Go to the website, <u>www.swindonu3a.org.uk</u> and click/tap on Login on the far right of the blue bar at the top of the page.


2.You will need your username. This was sent to you in August but if you need help just email or phone the office (<u>office@swindonu3a.org.uk</u> / 01793 614629) and we'll let you know the username the system has generated for you.

3. Enter your username and click/tap on the Forgot Password button.

4. On the next page click/tap on the Forgot Password button

5. You will be sent an email with a link. Click/tap on this to create a password – it will tell you what characters the password must contain.

6. Click or tap on the grey submit box. You will receive a reply saying your password has been reset and now you can now log in to your account with your username and password.



New Members' Meeting



Hot on the heels of last month's Volunteers' Event, over 50 people met at Coleview Community Centre on Sat Nov 25th with the focus on welcoming our newer members.

Committee members and other volunteers gave presentations on a variety of topics including: the ethos and culture of u3a; the role of the Office Team and the Monthly Meeting. There was an explanation of 'the big picture' in terms of the structure and running of our u3a. Linda Young provided a well-received introduction to Simple Membership, our new website and admin system.

Short Mat Bowls 1

"Short mat bowls is an indoor sport that originated in Ireland and is a variation on lawn bowls, from which it is derived. The aim of the game is to roll a bowl along a fairly flat surface and score points by getting the bowls closer to the jack (a small white ball) than the opponent's bowls. The carpet used for short mat bowls is between 40-45ft (12.2m – 13.7m) long and 6ft (1.8m) wide, with a fender at both ends and a white line representing the ditch 1ft (0.3m) in from the fender "



This is short mat bowls in a nutshell and is easy to learn and every member of our group is more than happy to assist a "newbie" to the game, whatever their abilities and experience in bowls

We have lively, friendly but very competitive sessions weekly at the Haydon Centre Swindon. But any rivalry is soon forgotten once the session is over. We play throughout the year- funding ourselves






during the U3a summer recess.

CONCERTGOERS

Fairy Tales and Pagan Rites with Bharatanatym Dance.

A group of 38 of us travelled to The Anvil Theatre in Basingstoke on a November evening to attend a performance of the 70 strong Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra with their Ukrainian conductor Kirill Karabits, together with Seeta Patel Dance.

First came Tchaikovsky's Sleeping Beauty suite. Composed in the last decade of the nineteenth century originally as a ballet in 3 acts, and later adapted as an orchestral suite. The story of the sleeping princess, the good fairy, the bad fairy and the folk tale characters who attended the wedding ball, was brought to life for us by Bournemouth Symphony's lively interpretation of Tchaikovsky's richly scored music which includes a harp and a full percussion section.

After the interval came Stravinsky's Rite of Spring composed only about 20 years later, but which shocked the western classical music scene at the time with its "crunching, snarling chords from the brass and thundering thumps from the tympani"! Like the Tchaikovsky, it also was composed as a ballet but now more often performed as an orchestral work. The music depicts a pagan ritual to celebrate the advent of Spring, and the interpretation we saw is the Indian dance style called Bharatanatym. The dancers used all their limbs including their fingers and toes with breathtaking dexterity, and the choreography fitted perfectly with the complexity and irregular beats of Stravinsky's music. This performance was premiered in Sadlers Wells in March this year and I believe we witnessed the 3rd ever performance. A section of the stalls was removed so that result of a collaboration between the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra and the Seeta Patel dance group whose speciality is the South the dancers (there were about 12 of them) could perform in front of the Orchestra with special lighting and smoke effects.

Thanks to Robin and the Team for selecting and organizing this concert and procuring great seats for us. We are looking forward to the next one!
