January Monthly Meeting: Agatha Christie Monday 13 January at 2.00 pm at Ellendune Community Centre



The New Year starts with Agatha Christie

Judith Cranswick will be speaking about Agatha Christie - The Queen of Crime. Discover how the highs and lows of Agatha's often turbulent life and times influenced the novels of the world's best-selling fiction writer.

Judith is a prolific crime writer who writes cosy travel mysteries. Her proudest achievement is to have had her novels compared to those of her great mentor and inspiration, Agatha Christie. The first of her Mystery at Sea series - Passage to Greenland - reached No. 1 in Amazon's best-seller charts.

Monday 10 February 2025 at 2.00 pm at Ellendune Community Centre Medical Detection Dogs

Our February speaker will be Danielle Mills from Medical Detection Dogs. This charity is at the forefront of innovative research into dogs' ability to detect the smell of human diseases and save lives. It trains dogs as Alert Assistance and Bio Detection Dogs.

Alert Assistance dogs are trained to support individuals with complex health conditions who have limited awareness of an impending life-threatening medical event, such as blood glucose conditions, Addison's disease, neurological problems and severe allergies. Using their amazing sense of smell, dogs can be trained to identify minute odour changes emitted before an emergency and alert the person to take preventative action.



Bio Detection dogs assist scientists through the charity's research into the development of electronic noses. The cancer dogs can provide additional screening for cancers that are currently difficult to diagnose, e.g. prostate cancer. Trials are also being conducted into Parkinson's and bacterial infections.

Sara Teasdale was an American lyric poet from St. Louis, Missouri, and used the name Filsinger after her 1914 marriage. In 1918, she won a Pulitzer Prize for her poetry collection: "Love Songs". Great poets can articulate what most of us find impossible to put into words. Here, with her uncomplicated verse, Sara Teasdale evokes for us the wonder of Christmas.

From 2016 to 2021, Jackie Kay was the "Makar" (Bard): the poet laureate of Scotland. She also served as Chancellor of the University of Salford between 2015 and 2022. Her partner for 15 years was another poet laureate: Carol Ann Duffy!!

Last Word

Last month, as an experiment, I altered the typeface from the current corporate style to a more classic style. I had 5 comments, all negative in one way or another, focused on the "serif" style and suggesting that a non-serif style was more helpful for people with visual weaknesses. I feel this is a fair point, and we're back to the Aptos font. However, this comment did make me curious. So I investigated what differing styles were used for.

Books, newsprint and written media tend to be published in texts with serifs such as **Times Roman**.

Information notices and publications come with non-serif styles such as TfL which uses Johnston typeface: designed for the London Underground in 1916 with subsequent updates. NB like many corporate typefaces, use is strictly controlled by the owner and may not be reproduced without a formal licence.

Also, organisations often change the font according to the purpose of the publication. Food for thought.

I received the latest u3a Friends Newsletter on December 25. This is always interesting with this month's news on seasonal yarn bombing, wreath making, Christmas customs around the world and a Maths quiz. Always something to learn or get ideas from.

Finally, thank you to everyone who has contributed to the Newsletter since I became editor. It's always difficult to know if I'm including news and information that members enjoy and learn from, and I hope I'm doing a positive job here. I do though rely on input from members and readers.
