The group enjoyed a fine trip in May to the new Bristol Beacon Hall, to hear the RPO play Saint-Saëns, Grieg and Sibelius, with a superb cello soloist.

Our next trip is **Thursday October 24th** to Birmingham Symphony Hall, including a visit to central Birmingham and the area around the Hall, with the outstanding new Library and the canals with cafes and restaurants.

#### **Programme: City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra**

- William Still, Threnody in memory of Jean Sibelius- 'a stunning tribute'.
- Prokofiev, Piano Concerto No2 with soloist Yeol Eum Son. 'It crackles with energy'
- **Sibelius**, Symphony No 5. Exuberant, inspired by the sight of flying swans in the sunset. 'One of my greatest experiences!', he wrote. 'It begins with the breadth and majesty of a vast, unfolding Nordic landscape'.

**Details: The c**oncert is at 2:15 pm, but we arrive in the city earlier, around 12:15 with time to look around, shop and get lunch.

**Pick-up points:** Swindon Downsview Road and Highworth Brewery St Car Park, approximate times around 10 am. Coach drop off points in the city centre and then at the Hall. The concert ends around 4:15 pm.

**The cost for 30 people: £**59 including good seats, coach and driver's gratuity, but if 40 people come, the cost is only £52 and you will get a *£7 refund* pp cash on the coach.

### Visit To. Army Museum of Flying Middle Wallop

Friday 18th October 2024

Tucked away just a few miles northeast of Salisbury lies the Museum of Army Flying adjacent to the Army Air Corps Airfield at Middle Wallop.

Devoted to telling the history of British Army Flying, two large hangars house the impressive journey of British soldiers in the air from the pioneering days of balloons and kites to the Glider Pilot Regiments dropping At Arnhem right through to the modern chapter of helicopter operations.

Overlooking the active airfield is the Apache Cafe, this is an excellent spot to enjoy a bite to eat or a drink whilst admiring all manner of AAC aircraft.

## **Life in a Poem** -submitted by Lesley Basu

Another beautiful poem from **Caroline Mellor** which, at this time of year when the children are returning to school, underlines how language is not just a means of communication but is deeply connected both to the imagination and to our cultural history.



## "Words are world-makers" — Robert MacFarlane

We need to teach the children the old words, words like brabble and grubble, twitter-light and clinkerbell; words which dance and trip and slip and drip like honey off the tongue

Teach them that a hazy halo of cloud around the moon is called a moonbroch and that swiftly moving clouds are named cairies; how a vixen's wedding is a sunny shower of rain, and that a single sunbeam breaking through thick cloud is known as a messenger

Teach them to know the seasons and scents of queen of the meadow and bride of the sun, how to tell Jupiter's staff from fairy fingers and which roses bloom with the strawberry moon

Teach them to spot pricklebacks in the tottlegrass, how to recognise a smeuse or a bishop-barnaby, when to watch the sky for flittermice and yaffles, and to pay attention to the dumbeldore and mousearnickle as she graces the lazy leahs of summer

Teach them a few of the old Sussex words for mud, like gubber and slub and stodge and pug, so they know that the precious soil beneath their toes is anything but worthless dirt

Teach them to be users and keepers and makers of the words which bring the land alive: a storybook, where everything has its rightful place, including us; where the wilds are fearful and filled with magic and people do noble things, and nothing is impossible

In this world of harsh new words — words like planetary dysmorphia and solastalgia, extinction debt and grief mitigation, megadrought and megafire, anthropogenic, pyrocene, words which alarm and get stuck in our throats describing a world which our hearts cannot grasp — we need to teach the children the old words, so that if they should feel lost, the old words might colour for them a warm and breathing, living map, a light to guide them safely home. **by Caroline Mellor**
