2025 AGM Round Up

The annual Swindon u3a AGM was held at Ellendune Community Centre on Monday 10 November. Thank you to all who attended and ensured that the meeting was quorate.

After a warm welcome, the Chair, Vince Williams gave an overview of the previous year, outlining the many activities which had taken place, such as Monthly Meetings often with interesting speakers and a chance to meet fellow members over tea and biscuits, Summer and Christmas Parties for all to enjoy, Open Day at the end of August, on-going publicity events, and a New Members Meeting. In summary, 2024-5 season had been a successful one for our u3a with an increase in the number of members enjoying all that our organisation has to offer.

This was followed by a report from our Treasurer Eric Hewitt, who showed several charts outlining the income and expenditure for the year, the move from cash to accrual accounting, reserves held and concluded that we were in a healthy financial position. Our accounts had been properly signed off by our accountants and copies sent to the Charity Commission.

Linda Young, Acting Vice-Chair, showed the present members of the Committee and current vacancies.
