Monthly Meetings

January 2025 Monthly Meeting Report -

The 2025 programme of Monthly Meetings got off to a great start with over 140 members listening to Judith Cranswick's talk on Agatha Christie – The Queen of Crime. The facts about Agatha Christie are astonishing: she sold some 300 million books in her lifetime, holds the record as the best-selling fiction writer of all time (her novels having sold between 2-3 billion copies), and is the third most widely published author of all time, outsold only by the Bible and Shakespeare. With her books being translated into at least 110 languages, she is the most translated author in the world. Her books reflected the world in which she lived. Working as a nurse in Torquay Hospital, she acquired a good knowledge of poisons, and inspiration for a certain Belgian detective (Hercule Poirot) came from the many Belgian refugees living in the town.

In 1926 Agatha disappeared for 10 days. In the midst of a divorce from her first husband, Archie Christie, her car was found abandoned, sparking a massive manhunt. She was eventually found at the Harrogate Spa Hotel in York and diagnosed with loss of memory, but the mystery of her disappearance has never been fully explained. The 1930's were her most productive years and the character of Miss Marple was developed in complete contrast to Poirot. By accompanying her second husband, the archaeologist Max Mallowan, on his expeditions, Agatha gained inspiration for books such as Murder on the Orient Express and Death on the Nile.

During WWII, Agatha lived in London and worked in the pharmacy at University College Hospital London. Death by poisoning became increasingly more common in her novels after the war, due no doubt to her time spent in the pharmacy.

Whilst not necessarily great literature, Agatha Christie produced entertaining novels with numerous red herrings and clever endings that everyone can enjoy. Her murder mystery play The Mousetrap is still going strong in London's West End and has kept millions entertained for over 70 years!

Monday 10 February 2025 at 2.00 pm at Ellendune Community Centre Medical Detection Dogs

Our February speaker will be **Danielle Mills from Medical Detection Dogs**. This charity is at the forefront of innovative research into dogs' ability to detect the smell of human diseases and save lives. It trains dogs as Alert Assistance and Bio Detection Dogs.

Alert Assistance dogs are trained to support individuals with complex health conditions who have limited awareness of an impending life-threatening medical event, such as blood glucose conditions, Addison's disease, neurological problems and severe allergies. Using their amazing sense of smell, dogs can be trained to identify minute odour changes emitted before an emergency and alert the person to take preventative action.



Bio Detection dogs assist scientists through the charity's research into the development of electronic noses. The cancer dogs can provide additional screening for cancers that are currently difficult to diagnose, e.g. prostate cancer. Trials are also being conducted into Parkinson's and bacterial infections.

Early warnings for March and April

Monday 10 March 2025 at 2.00 pm at Ellendune Community Centre Secrets and Spies - and we might discover the real James Bond

Stewart Smith will help us discover the history and secrets surrounding the village of Coleshill and the important role it played during the second World War.



Coleshill House was the underground headquarters of Winston Churchill's British Resistance Organisation - a band of men from all over the country trained and ready to lead the fightback if Germany invaded Great Britain. Known as the Auxiliers, they were sworn to secrecy and led double lives revealed not even to their closest family.

14 April 2025 at 2.00 pm at Ellendune Community Centre Swindon Community Bird Boxes: Jeremy Smith

For more than 25 years there has been a community bird box project in Swindon with over 600 bird boxes located across all of the parks and green spaces associated with this town. We are not aware of any such project anywhere else.

If you walk around any of the parks and look up into the trees you will almost certainly see one of these boxes located 4 meters off the ground pointing between North and East to provide the most sheltered and protected position.

They will often look quite weather-worn as the materials used are all natural using FSC sourced wood, no glue (there is a dot on the back to hold a peg which protects the base from water running down the tree), initially when new they have water-based paint but that does not last long, and the boxes merge into the environment and from time to time need replacing as they naturally weather.

Without question these boxes have boosted the population of Tits and Nuthatches in the area and as you walk through the parks the joy of birdsong in spring is everywhere.
