I'm just out of our monthly Management Committee meeting and preparations are now well underway

for our AGM on the 11th of November. Please try to get along to the event if you possibly can, because we must get a minimum headcount of 100 valid members to have a Quorum. Currently, we are not there yet. I know from personal experience that sometimes it can be difficult to park at some of our larger events, so please consider car sharing with other members if you can.

At the AGM we vote for next year's Trustees. We have nominations for seven positions so far, including the core roles needed to run our organisation, but that still leaves two Trustee roles unfilled: these roles include Publicity Lead and Liaison Secretary.

Nominations in time for voting at the AGM are now formally closed, but that doesn't mean we are not accepting new nominations, The Committee can review applications and bring new trustees on board at any time of the year. For some years now the board of the "Third Age Trust" have been assessing the need for operational changes. Last year the board drew up a proposal for a new governance structure. Their proposal was sent to all u3as in January.

The proposal introduces a new Council of Representatives that will sit between the Board of the Third Age Trust and individual u3a's. All members of this new Council would be made up of u3a members who would represent their regions and networks.

The Council promotes the needs of u3as, identifies overall trends, and contributes to the overall strategy and development of the u3a movement.

A smaller Board will provide oversight of the Trust's performance and ensure compliance with charity, corporate law, and other legal requirements Each u3a was asked to consider and vote on the proposal at the Third Age Trust AGM held on the 16th

October 2024. The proposal for the new structure was overwhelmingly approved, The aim is to become operational by April 2025..

The AGM will provide more details of our organisation's performance in the last year, as well as our current financial status. You have an opportunity to ask questions about both current performance and future plans as well as make suggestions to myself and the current Management Committee. Please attend if you can.

Monthly meetings for November and December 2024 and report of October Meeting

1 Report of October 14 Meeting: Commonwealth War Graves Commission

Tony Hearn spoke at the October Monthly Meeting about the background to the Commonwealth War Graves Commission and outlined how its work continues today. At the end of WWI, Sir Fabian Ware, Commander of the British Red Cross, began recording the details of soldiers who had been killed during the war. This was too great a task for just one team and the Graves Registration Unit was formed with responsibility for recording and marking graves. This subsequently became the Imperial War Graves Commission in 1917.

The real work started after the Armistice. It was an enormous task to try to identify the servicemen and establish the cemeteries on a global basis. In fact, Rudyard Kipling described it as "the single biggest piece of work since the Pharaohs … and they only worked in their own country".

Today the Commission commemorates the 1.7 million men and women of the Commonwealth who died during the First and Second World Wars. They maintain some 1.1 million headstones at more than 23,000 locations in 150 countries around the world, with the majority of sites being in Europe.

- Thiepval Memorial alone lists 72,000 missing British and South African servicemen who died in the Battles of the Somme.
- **Tyne Cot Memorial** bears the names of almost 35,000 officers and men whose graves are not known and has nearly 12,000 Commonwealth servicemen buried in its Cemetery. 70% of whom are unknown.

Commonwealth War Graves headstones are of the same design worldwide and are inscribed with a person's name, rank, awards, service number, religious emblem and a personal inscription provided by the family. There is usually a regimental crest or badge at the top of the headstone.

In the UK there are some 306,000 memorials in 13,000 locations, including sites such as Whitworth Road, Radnor Street and St Mary's Rodbourne in Swindon.

The Commission is also one of the largest horticultural organisations in the world. It ensures there is always some colour in the cemeteries, even in the desert, and it is well known for its spectacular rose displays.

With so many sites to look after, the Commission cannot visit every single one regularly and is always looking for volunteers who can take on the task of looking after a local site, some of which may just have one or two headstones, but nevertheless need to be maintained to a high standard.

Recently a number of reburials have taken place in Northern France as more and more remains of soldiers are unearthed due to a major canal construction project that runs through the heart of the Somme battlefield. And so the work of the Commission continues

3 Proposed revival of the CLIMATE CHANGE GROUP from Bill Hughes

Climate change, or runaway global heating, is the greatest threat to our very survival. Scientists have known about this for decades and those in power and authority have acknowledged this seriously since the UN Rio conference in 1992 when outline plans were made by many nations to transition to a low or no carbon economy.

It seems that lip service was given by authorities and some of the mainstream media but effective action has been a painfully slow or non-existent in some cases. In 2015 the IPCC Paris Agreement, hopes were raised that nations were going to implement policies that would keep average global temperatures below an increase in 1.5 degrees C (a critical turning point for climate stability) compared with pre-industrial temperatures and achieve "net zero" by 2050.

However, as the recent devastating hurricanes Milton and Helene in Florida have grimly reminded us, temperatures of the seas and oceans are increasing, and that the worldwide burning of fossil fuels is actually increasing and the CO,2 emissions that cause the "greenhouse effect."

To help understand the crisis we are in, I propose having 6 monthly meetings in which we look at understanding the basic science and jargon from the prospective of an interested lay person.

This will include the ecological, economic, social, political, psychological and other aspects of climate change and measures and policies for mitigation and coping with this increasingly critical situation.

Even in Swindon, we have seen in recent years more severe weather and the flooding of roads and land with prolonged heavy rain and flash flooding. In the building of new developments around Swindon, areas of flood plain such as Wichelstowe, lagoons have had to be made to take the run-off of excess water during severe rainfall.
